



# Preventive vs Diagnostic Services Fact Sheet

As you plan your screening, it is important to understand the difference between preventive tests and diagnostic tests. Your insurance coverage may be different depending on how the test is classified.

The American Cancer Society found convincing evidence that screening for colorectal cancer in adults aged 45 to 75 years reduces colorectal cancer mortality.<sup>1</sup>

## Preventive Screening vs Diagnostic Testing Understanding the Difference and its Impact on Coverage



### Preventive Screening

A test (eg, fecal occult blood test, fecal immunochemical test, stool DNA test [Cologuard<sup>®</sup>], sigmoidoscopy, or colonoscopy) is performed on a patient who does not have symptoms but is in a group at risk for colon cancer, such as<sup>2,3</sup>:

- Between the ages of 45 and 75<sup>2</sup>
- Has a family history of colon cancer<sup>2</sup>

Many healthcare plans cover preventative screenings with no out-of-pocket cost to you. Check with your insurance provider for more information.<sup>4</sup>



### Diagnostic Testing

A colonoscopy is used to diagnose a health condition in response to certain symptoms, such as<sup>4,5</sup>:

- Bleeding or irregularity
- Positive result of a preventive screening

You may have to pay a co-pay, coinsurance, or deductible.<sup>4</sup>
